Superintendent's Update

Superintendent Dr. Connelly shared the following update with the Board:

Partnership with NCSU

CCS will be partnering with N.C. State University to build a leadership pipeline for the district's low-performing/high-poverty schools and support its premier professionals. The Principal Preparation Program, which will help prepare school leaders to move student achievement in a positive direction, is free to participants as long as they work as school leaders in public schools after graduation.

It was also shared that NCSU's Master of School Administration program is an innovative model of preparation, early career support, and continuous professional development for leaders who have the desire and commitment to lead high-need schools.
