Superintendent Updates the Board

ELA K-5 Core Product Adoption Approved

The Curriculum Committee's final recommendation of Wonders (2023) from McGraw Hill Education was adopted by the Board as the district's ELA K-5 Core curriculum. In March and April, CCS educators, families of students and the general public were given the opportunity to review four different ELA curriculum products and give their feedback. The adoption of Wonders (2023) in CCS will span from 2022-27.

Superintendent's Budget Gets 'Two Thumbs Up'

The School Board unanimously approved the proposed budget for the 2022-23 school year that according to Superintendent Dr. Connelly "focuses on lifting up every student, every school, and every premier professional throughout the district and rising above the negative impacts of COVID-19." As part of his presentation, he recommended how to allocate the \$699 million proposed budget, titled "Together, We Will Rise." School Board Approves to Endorse NCSBA's Legislative Agenda

Through the legislative agenda for the 2022 short session of the North Carolina General Assembly, the Board approved adopting and endorsing the North Carolina School Boards Association (NCSBA) 2022 Legislative Agenda items and added the following: Additional Funding for Classified Employee Compensation; the definition of Full-Time Equivalency, and Gray's Creek Water Extension.

The 2022-23 Student Code of Conduct 'Gets the Greenlight'

Members of the Board approved the Cumberland County Schools' Student Code of Conduct for the 2022-23 school year. The purpose of the Student Code of Conduct, which is distributed to all students at the beginning of each year, is to state clearly the standards for acceptable conduct among students. According to the Code of Conduct, "the goal of student discipline is not punitive, but rather to maintain safe and caring schools, to teach students to behave in ways that contribute to academic achievement and school success, and to support an exceptional school environment where students and staff are responsible and respectful."

Nursing Contracts for 2021-22 & 2022-23 School Years OK'd

Approval was given by the Board for the Cumberland County Health Department to provide nursing services to Cumberland County Schools. The contracts state that the Health Department will provide for the employment and supervision of 14 nurses in CCS for a minimum of 10 months.

Board Approves High School's Concession Stand Donation

The Board approved the plan for E.E. Smith High School (EESHS) alum to fundraise and ultimately build a concession stand on campus. According to Construction Development Services, Inc., in Norfolk, VA, the 1,423 sq. ft. building will cost \$172,000. Efforts are being made by former EESHS students, with the support of the high school's alumni association.

to sponsor the Legacy Brick Fundraiser, which will allow individuals or families to purchase a brick paver to be placed on campus leading to the proposed concession stand. Additional funds remaining from the effort will be used toward student scholarships.

Supplemental Janitorial Services Contract 'Rubberstamped'

Approval was given for Auxiliary Services to contract for supplemental janitorial services for the purpose of augmenting custodial support at various locations throughout the district where shortages have become critical. The work will be performed on a job order basis and ESSER Funding will be used cover this contract. According to Auxiliary Services, as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic, "CCS has had difficulty maintaining an adequate number of custodians at some schools, placing additional stress and responsibilities on existing staff."

Elementary School's Media Center to be Named After Long-time CCS Educator Members of the Board approved naming the media center at E. Melvin Honeycutt Elementary School "The Lori Mueller Media Center" after the school's former principal. Mueller helped welcome the first class of students in 1995 as the assistant principal and became the principal in 2000, where she faithfully served until 2020. In a statement supporting the media center's naming, it was written: "Mrs. Mueller truly believed that reading was the foundation of all learning so she constantly stressed the importance of learning to read... Her love for reading and her desire for all students to be afforded every

opportunity to become lifelong readers will be forever present and remembered in the Lori

The Board supported the request for electoral redistricting consultants to provide two additional options to be reviewed and considered at a future Board meeting.

Board Approves Revised COVID-19 Face Coverings Policy

The Board approved Revised Policy 6141 COVID-19 Face Coverings. The policy recognizes that face masks are optional (1) for Cumberland County Schools' students, staff and visitors and (2) on all public-school transportation. The policy further states that (1) since COVID-19 vaccines are much more widely available, CCS will continue to provide for voluntary testing of staff and students in all schools; and (2) As required by North Carolina Session Law 2021-130 (Senate Bill 654), and consistent with the action taken at the February 8, 2022, monthly Board meeting, the face coverings policy is in effect until further notice.
